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Northeast Indiana and Northwest Ohio Students Announced as 2024 Scholastic Art & Writing Awards Regional Winners

506 Young Artists and Writers Recognized by the Fort Wayne Museum of Art for their Original Works

February 8, 2024 (Fort Wayne, IN) – The Fort Wayne Museum of Art has announced the regional award winners of the 2024 <u>Scholastic Art & Writing Awards</u>. Presented by the nonprofit organization the **Alliance for Young Artists & Writers**, the 101st Scholastic Art & Writing Awards are the country's longest-running and most prestigious scholarship and recognition program for creative students in grades 7–12. This year, nearly 100,000 teens from across the United States and Canada submitted their best art and writing. 506 creative teens from Northeast Indiana and Northwest Ohio received regional honors, including Gold Keys, Silver Keys, Honorable Mentions, and American Visions & Voices nominations, from local Scholastic Awards Affiliate the Fort Wayne Museum of Art.

The following ten students—five artists and five writers—received the top regional honor, the American Visions & Voices nomination, signifying their work as best-in-show.

In celebration of this year's regional award winners, the Fort Wayne Museum of Art will host an **Open House Celebration** on **Sunday, February 18th from 12pm-5pm** with free admission.

The exhibition of awarded works will be on display at FWMoA from February 10 – April 7 in the Museum's galleries at 311 E. Main Street. General admission to see this exhibition at the museum is free for FWMoA members, \$10 adults, \$8 students and seniors 65+, and \$25 for families. General admission is free for everyone on Thursdays 5-8pm. Veterans, active military personnel, and their families receive free general admission. FWMoA gallery hours are Tuesday-Saturday 10-6pm, Thursdays 10-8pm, and Sundays 12-5pm.

Note: This exhibition will be closed to the public February 26 – March 4 for the ARTrageous Gala and Auction fundraiser as well as March 31 for the Easter holiday.

Since the program's founding in 1923, the Awards have fostered the creativity and talent of millions of students and include a distinguished list of alumni such as **Tschabalala Self, Stephen King, Kay WalkingStick, Charles White, Joyce Carol Oates,** and **Andy Warhol,** all of whom received recognition in the Awards when they were teens.

For **Gold Key** works of art and writing in the Awards' 28 categories—including architecture, painting, flash fiction, poetry, printmaking, science fiction & fantasy, and more—the opportunities for recognition will continue when the works are considered for national honors, including a wealth of additional opportunities, such as scholarships, inclusion in the Scholastic Awards Traveling Exhibition, and in anthologies Best Teen Art and Best Teen Writing. Poets who win national awards are considered for the National Student Poets Program, the nation's highest honor for young poets presenting original work. National awards will be announced on June 12, 2024.
